WHAT CAN I DO?

- Do not include any pork, bacon or ham products in your diet. Always read labels on processed goods.
- Join Animal Liberation Queensland and go to www.animalliberationqld.org.au to get more information. Perhaps you could help us with our public awareness campaigns to let people know exactly how pigs are reared in factory farms in Australia.
- Talk to your family, friends and workmates about how factory farmed pigs are kept, and the cruel journey they endure from shed to slaughter to reach the supermarket shelves.
- Do more research on factory farming in Australia by going to Voiceless www.voiceless.org.au or Animals Australia www.animalsaustralia.org. Both are excellent resources.
- Contact the Animal Welfare Unit at the Department of Primary Industries and Fisheries, Qld on www.dpi.qld.gov.au and voice your objections to the way intensively farmed pigs are currently treated. Request that they consider improving the minimum animal welfare standards in the Code and adhere to a strong monitoring program.
- Be aware that pigs raised in alternative systems ('free range', 'bred free range' or 'organic') are usually provided with a better quality of life than those on factory farms. However, all commercially raised pigs will be subjected to the stresses of transport to slaughter, and slaughtered in the same manner as factory farmed pigs. There are no 'organic' abattoirs.
